FIRST READING

Acts 2:14, 36-41

On the day of Pentecost Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd with a loud voice: 'The whole House of Israel can be certain that God has made this Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ.'

Hearing this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and the apostles, 'What must we do, brothers?' 'You must repent,' Peter answered 'and every one of you must be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise that was made is for you and your children, and for all those who are far away, for all those whom the Lord our God will call to himself.' He spoke to them for a long time using many arguments, and he urged them, 'Save yourselves from this perverse generation.' They were convinced by his arguments, and they accepted what he said and were baptised. That very day about three thousand were added to their number.

The merit, in the sight of God, is in bearing punishment patiently when you are punished after doing your duty.

This, in fact, is what you were called

to do, because Christ suffered for you and left an example for you to follow the way he took. He had not done anything wrong, and there had been no perjury in his mouth. He was insulted and did not retaliate with insults; when he was tortured he made no threats but he put his trust in the righteous judge. He was bearing our faults in his own body on the cross, so that we might die to our faults and live for holiness; through his wounds you have been healed. You had gone astray like sheep but now you have come back to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the good shepherd, says the Lord; I know my own sheep and mine know me. Alleluia!

John 10:1-10

Jesus said:

'I tell you most solemnly, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate, but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. The one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the flock; the gatekeeper lets him in, the sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out. When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice. They never follow a stranger but run away from him: they do not recognise the voice of strangers.'

FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Sheep and **shepherds** are images used often by Jesus in His preaching. Many households of His day would have

had at least a few sheep. These images would have resonated strongly with them. The Old Testament is full of images of God as Shepherd, of leaders spoken of as good or bad shepherds of the people. Jesus must often have prayed the psalm we see in our Sunday liturgy this week "The Lord is my shepherd." He talks of Himself as the Good Shepherd.

Today He adds a new image, that of the gate to the sheepfold. "I am the gate" He says. "I protect my sheep from those who bring death, I allow my sheep out to green pastures."

Let us place our trust in Jesus who as the gate allows us into the sure shelter of His compassion and leads us out into the abundance of life.

MAY - MONTH OF MARY Mary's "Yes" and ours.

Mary had a plan for her life. She would get married to Joseph, settle down and raise a family, live by her Jewish faith. All this went out the window when she was **asked** by the angel to



bear the Messiah, the Son of God. She knew that this could mean possible misunderstanding by Joseph and her community. But convinced this was what was being asked of her she said "Yes" and continued to say "Yes" to all that this came to mean in her life, from giving birth in a stable to seeing her only son die on a Cross. There were lovely moments too, visiting Elizabeth, the wedding feast of Cana. To these she said "Yes" as well.

This month we ask Mary to help us to say our "Yes" to all that is good in our lives, to all that is difficult.

One prayer that helps us reflect on all this is the Rosary. Perhaps with more time on our hands we might feel inspired to take up our beads once more.

MAY 1ST ST JOSEPH THE WORKER Prayer of Pope Francis to St Joseph



Saint Joseph, enlighten those responsible for the common good, so that they might know - as you do how to care for those entrusted to their responsibility.

Grant intelligence of knowledge to those seeking adequate means for the health and physical well-being of their brothers and sisters. Sustain those who are dedicating their efforts to serve those in need, even at the cost of their own safety: the volunteers, nurses, and doctors working on the front lines in tending to the sick.

O Saint Joseph, protect our families: preserve the elderly from loneliness: grant that no one might be left in desperation from abandonment and discouragement. With the Virgin Mother, beg the Lord to liberate the world from every form of pandemic. Amen.

SOFT OPENING OF CHURCHES

Sydney Archbishop, Anthony Fisher OP, has written to Premier Gladys Berejiklian on behalf of the New South Wales bishops, imploring her to start re-opening churches "initially for private prayer and confession" "It's likely that such a 'soft opening' will happen before we can resume public Masses. "And whether it's for prayers or Mass, we are determined to abide by government directives regarding numbers, density (or distancing) and hygiene," he said.

He says he has been "hugely encouraged" that thousands of Catholics are still participating in Masses online while churches are closed and "making a spiritual communion where they cannot make a sacramental one".

"If 'absence makes the heart grow fonder', it may be that, rather than becoming accustomed to doing Church from home, our hunger for the Eucharist will intensify and make us value all the more gathering for it when at last we can. In the meantime, we've been given a time of retreat to meditate upon what Holy Communion means to us all, and we've been given new opportunities and new pastoral strategies." CathNews

SAINT ROSA VENERINI Feast Day May 7th (1656 – 1728)

A doctor's daughter, Saint Rosa Venerini founded Catholic schools for girls and



young women. The Cardinal provided the material means and Rosa made the families aware, trained teachers, and organised schools

sometimes in the face of opposition that resorted to force in unbelievable fashion. The teachers were shot at with bows and their house fired. Rosa Venerini died a saintly death in the community of St. Mark's in Rome on May 7, 1728. She had opened more than forty schools. Pope Benedict XVI canonised St. Rosa (also known as St. Rose) in 2006. He spoke in his homily of her courageous work for "the spiritual elevation and authentic emancipation of the young women of her time."

- 1. **Prayers were offered for sick members** of the parish. Father is particularly concerned for those in Residential Care isolated from their families.
- 2. **Letters to God.** Father burnt those at Victor at Easter time and will do the same with Goolwa letters once he has collected them.
- 3. **Solar panels** on the roof of the Annex and that of the Parish House have been completed. Many thanks to St Joan's Social Club who suggested and funded this addition and to Mark Leaney for championing this project in the PPC and working with HelenTaylor, Chairperson of the Financial committee to finalise arrangements.
- 4. **Concerns** for difficulties with collection of planned giving envelopes and first collection money particularly in Goolwa were raised by Paul Kennelly and John Dunthorne on behalf of the Knights. A letter from Helen Taylor re this matter is being sent out with the Encounter.

Anyone who enters through me will be safe: he will go freely in and out and be sure of finding pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy.

I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full.'

Adam looked with glee at his first big commission cheque from his interior design company. He decided to buy a Porsche. As he strolled around the car showroom looking at \$100,000-plus sports cars, he couldn't find the colour he wanted - lapis blue metallic. The salesmen said not to worry, that they could order it and directed him to the model Adam has his eye on. "How 'bout we go for a test drive?" the salesman suggested.

Adam got in the driver's seat and spend a moment soaking up the luxury. He turned on the radio and the knob came off. "Oh," the salesman said, "it's just the test car". Adam nodded and opened the window. It got stuck halfway down. As he was pulling out onto the road, the gear shift locked. Adam shot a fiery look at the salesman and said: "Excuse me! But I am not having a Porsche experience".

Oh, what any of us would give for that elusive experience - the one where we're finally enjoying all the comforts we feel we deserve. But, the truth is, we're never going to get there in a car, not even a lapis blue metallic Porsche. The only way to reach green pastures is through Jesus. At least that's what Christians believe. ENTER THROUGH ME

Sitting on a plane earlier in the year on my way to the United States, I listened to the flight attendant reviewing the usual procedures for emergency exists, something all of us hope we don't have to make. She was pointing out the doors, the floor lights, the floatation devices and all those instructions that frequent fliers have heard countless times. I tried to imagine myself remembering all these details in a crisis and doubted that I could. Pull WHAT cord? Move in WHICH direction? Even in the best of times, my sense of direction is terrible.

How wonderful that, in that most significant sense of the word, we do not have to make our way to safety on our own. Jesus is the gate, the gatekeeper, and the shepherd. Our only task is to listen for the voice of the Beloved, and to follow where it leads. No harm can come to the one who lives this simple rule.
