LATEST ADVICE COVID-SAFE MARSHALLS

"Covid-safe Marshalls" will be required in various locations including places of worship to ensure social distancing. South Australia's existing density requirements of one person per two square metres will remain in place. The move has been "determined as an effective measure to ensure people's compliance with physical distancing and hygiene requirements", police commissioner Grant Stevens said in a press conference. THE ASSUMPTION OF OUR LADY AUGUST 15th

The Church celebrates the Feast Day of the Assumption of Our Lady when according to our faith, the Holy Mother, "having com-



pleted her course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory".

The Assumption signals the end of Mary's earthly life and marks her return to heaven to be reunited with Jesus. It gives us hope that we too will be united with Him after our death.

Although defined as an article of faith by Pope Pius XII just over half a century ago, the Assumption of Our Lady into heaven has been accepted from back to the earliest of Christian times.

For many, the most telling verification of the Assumption can be found not only in learned theological studies or definitive doctrinal statements, but in the experience of Mary's many apparitions which the Church has declared worthy of belief. Where these apparitions have appeared have become beloved Holy shrines visited by millions each year and include the Shrines of Our Lady at Guadalupe, Lourdes and Fatima. *Catholic Weekly*

MAINTENANCE WORK AT ST JOAN'S

ELECTRICAL: Four security lights and an annex cloister downlight replaced, the porch hanging lights and toilet lights upgraded, an exterior power point replaced and vacuum cleaners serviced. **GENERAL**: Storm drains cleaned, garden tap replaced, key safes mounted on two sheds, lectern repaired, two wattle trees removed, presbytery fence repaired, porch notice boards refurbished, BBQ shed cleaned out, car park safety barrier built, office "letter drop" box replaced. All the above tasks were labour free with free materials in some cases. A contractor was only used once for the removal of two gum trees. An active maintenance group is a saving on church funds. However, as our number of regular members is dwindling, extra help is needed, skilled or otherwise.

SAINT PIUS X, POPE Feast Day 21st August (1835 – 1914)

Joseph Sarto was born in humble circumstances in a small Venetian village. He was successively curate, parish priest, bishop of Mantua, Patriarch of Venice, and was elected



Pope on August 4, 1903, taking the name of Pius X. As chief pastor of the Church he displayed untiring self-sacrifice and great energy. He realised to the full the value of the liturgy as the prayer of the Church. He spared no effort to propagate the practice of early, frequent and daily communion. Within a few days of the outbreak of WW1 he fell ill with bronchitis, to which he succumbed on 20th August. He was canonised on May 29, 1954, the first Pope canonised

since St. Pius V in 1672. Catholic Culture

DID YOU KNOW?

- The cities of Tyre and Sidon were the leading towns of ancient Phoenicia. Both cities were on the Mediterranean coast of what is now modern Lebanon. The Phoenicians were descendants of the even more ancient Canaanites who populated the area earlier.
- Israel despised the Canaanites. It loathed the Canaanite religion with its pagan gods and fertility cults and found many of their practices abominable.

EXPLORING THE WORD

In this gospel, we find another example of the common device used by Matthew to denote the movement of Christianity from a Jewish to a Gentile setting. Jesus has left the Jewish region around the Sea of Galilee and travelled north-west to the Gentile territory of what was ancient Phoenicia in Syria.

Jesus' fame has obviously spread even here, but the focus of the passage is not the cure but the dialogue. The woman knows full well that Jesus is Jewish as she hails him as 'Son of David'. His silence in the face of her plea is explained in the next versehe did not want to exceed his divine mission, which he saw as gathering all Israel into the kingdom. Jesus' response is harsh, but the woman is quick to seize on his imagery and twist it to her advantage, but with humility. She forces Jesus to confront a truth—God's salvation is available to all. He responds generously with both his praise and his healing power.

SHARING THE TRADITION

In the centuries after the Emperor Constantine accepted Christianity and it ultimately became the State religion and he moved his capital from Rome to Constantinople, different cultural expressions of the same faith emerged. In the western half of the empire, Rome initially dominated religious practices and was gradually replaced by the Celtic Church after the fall of Rome. In the eastern half of the Roman Empire, Constantinople dominated and many eastern or Byzantine cultural expressions entered worship.

Different ways of worshipping developed. This situation still exists today within the Church. The Roman Rite is familiar to us and other Rites of the Catholic Church include the Maronite. Melkite and Ukranian Rite. These groups are completely loval to the Pope and the magisterium (teaching authority) of the Church. Such Rites are different from the Orthodox traditions which do not recognise the Pope as leader of the Church and sometimes hold slightly different beliefs from the Catholic traditions. The Orthodox traditions broke away from the Church at various times in the early centuries. usually over issues of doctrinal formulation, in much the same way as the Protestant traditions broke away or formed independently.

Since the Second Vatican Council, enormous moves forward have been made in entering into dialogue with other Christian churches and other faiths. Ecumenism and inter-religious dialogue was a goal which is very close to heart Pope Francis, and was also for his predecessors.
