GOSPEL

John 11:1-45

There was a man named Lazarus who lived in the village of Bethany with two sisters, Mary and Martha, and he was ill. It was the same Mary, the sister of the sick man Lazarus, who anointed the Lord with ointment and wiped his feet with her hair. The sisters sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.' Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.' The disciples said, 'Rabbi, it is not long since the Jews wanted to stone you; are you going back again?' Jesus replied:

'Are there not twelve hours in the day? A man can walk in the daytime without stumbling because he has the light of this world to see by; but if he walks at night he stumbles, because there is no light to guide him.'

LEADLIGHT WINDOW GOOLWA

It is lovely to see the connections between the windows in our two parish Churches.

From the plaque next to the Goolwa window

The pointed arched window symbolises the transition from the old Cadell Street Church to the present Church in Gardiner Street.

This is encased by the border with the new church cradling the tradition and culture of the

The fish is an ancient Christian symbol and the three fish in this window represent the Holy Trinity and also relate to Our Lord's instruction that we become "fishers of men". These fish are jumping for joy as also should we in receipt of the many blessings bestowed

Green and gold, Australia's colours, are found in our local landscape along with the blue of the ocean – the creations of God the Father, whilst the rays of light reflect His mercy and blessings.

Central to the window are the Holy Cross, Jesus' Crown of Thorns, the Host and the Chalice.

Behind are the stars of the Southern Cross. which identify us as the Church in Australia, and the blue waves placing us in the river port of Goolwa adjacent to the Great Southern Ocean.

Each star has 7 points symbolising the gifts of the Holy Spirit;

Wisdom - Understanding - Counsel-Knowledge - Fortitude - Piety - Fear of the Lord. Hovering above the Cross is the guiding light of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove.

OUR NEW ARCHBISHOP



Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Patrick O'Regan, currently Bishop of the Diocese of Sale in Victoria, as the 12th Archbishop of Adelaide. It was announced on March 19th, the Feast of St Joseph.

Bishop O'Regan said his appointment comes at a critical moment for Catholics in Adelaide and across the country. "With Adelaide set to host the first assembly of the historic Fifth Plenary Council of Australia later this year, this is an exciting time for the Archdiocese of Adelaide," he said. "I look forward to playing my part alongside the people of the Archdiocese in welcoming to Adelaide the Church from right across Australia."

Bishop O'Regan was born in Bathurst in 1958. He was educated at St Joseph's Primary School in Perthville, the village in which he grew up, and at St Stanislaus' College Bathurst. He undertook seminary training at St Columba's College Springwood and St Patrick's College Manly, and was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Bathurst in 1983. He was appointed Bishop of Sale in December 2014, with his episcopal consecration in February 2015. He holds a licentiate in sacred liturgy and sacramental theology from the Institut Catholique de Paris and is a member of the International Commission on English in the Liturgy.

Bishop O'Regan succeeds Archbishop
Philip Wilson, who resigned as Archbishop of Adelaide in July 2018. He thanked
Bishop Greg O'Kelly SJ, who since then
in addition to his role as Bishop of Port
Pirie has served as Apostolic Administrator of Adelaide and will continue to do so
until Bishop O'Regan's installation – the
date for which is still to be decided.
"Bishop O'Kelly has been exceptionally
generous and inspirational in overseeing
the entire Church in South Australia during this time and I know the people of
Adelaide have appreciated his wise leadership," Bishop O'Regan said. "They

have also no doubt been looking forward to the Pope's announcement of a new Archbishop. I pray that I will be the pastor that the Church in Adelaide needs at this time."

Bishop O'Regan said the announcement comes on a special day . "As someone who has a deep Josephite spirituality, it feels quite fitting – even providential – that Pope Francis has chosen today, St Joseph's feast day, to call me to this new mission," he said. "I will certainly be asking St Joseph to intercede for me and for the Church in Adelaide."

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference president Archbishop Mark Coleridge said Bishop O'Regan has "shown himself to be a man of unusual gifts, one of which is his deep sense of pastoral care for the people entrusted to his care and another of which is his quirky sense of humour". "Bishop Pat's brothers within the Conference join him in praying for his new mission as shepherd of the Church in Adelaide, which has known difficulties in recent times but which can now look to the future more peacefully," Archbishop Coleridge said. He said that and then added, 'Our friend Lazarus is resting, I am going to wake him.' The disciples said to him, 'Lord, if he is able to rest he is sure to get better.' The phrase Jesus used referred to the death of Lazarus, but they thought that by 'rest' he meant 'sleep', so Jesus put it plainly, 'Lazarus is dead; and for your sake I am glad I was not there because now you will believe. But let us go to him.' Then Thomas – known as the Twin – said to the other disciples, 'Let us go too, and die with him.'

On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. Bethany is only about two miles from Jerusalem, and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to sympathise with them over their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that, even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said:

'I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?'

'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.'

When she had said this, she went and called her sister Mary, saying in a low voice, 'The Master is here and wants to see you.' Hearing this, Mary got up quickly and went to him. Jesus had not yet come into the village; he was still at the place where Martha had met him. When the Jews who were in the house sympathising with Mary saw her get up so quickly and go out, they followed her, thinking that she was going to the tomb to weep there.


Mary went to Jesus, and as soon as she saw him she threw herself at his feet, saying, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.' At the sight of her tears, and those of the Jews who followed her, Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'Lord, come and see.'

Jesus wept; and the Jews said, 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened the eyes of the blind man, could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said:

'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I knew indeed that you always hear me, but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.'

When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.'

Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.
