SAINT PIUS OF PIETRELCINA Feast Day 23rd September (1887 - 1968)



Padre Pio, a farmer's son, was born in Pietrelcina, Italy. He joined the Capuchin Friars at sixteen and was ordained a priest in 1910. For fifty years at the monastery of San Giovanni Rotundo he was a spiritual advisor, confessor, and inter-

cessor who devoted his life to the Eucharist and prayer. While praying before a cross on September 20, 1918, Padre Pio received the stigmata. He is the first priest ever to be so blessed. Today there are over 400,000 members worldwide in prayer groups begun by Padre Pio in the 1920s.

In 1956 he founded the House for the Relief of Suffering, a hospital that serves 60,000 a year. Padre Pio died on September 23, 1968 at age 81. Catholic Culture

SAINTS ANDREW KIM TAE-GON, PAUL CHONG HA-SANG & COMPAN-IONS

Feast Day 20th September



During the 17th century the Christian faith was brought to Korea by lay persons. Many of these Christians suffered martyrdom

during the 19th century. Among the most notable were Andrew Kim Taegon, the first Korean priest, and the lay apostle, Paul Chong Hasang; they were canonized by Pope John Paul II on May 6, 1984. Today's feast honours a group of 103 martyrs including religious and heroic laity of all ages. *Catholic Culture*

SAINT MATTHEW

Feast Day 21st September

Matthew was a publican (a taxcollector) for the Romans. Publicans were regarded by the Pharisees as

sinners, not allowed to trade, eat, or pray with other Jews. One day, while Matthew was seated at his table of books and money, Jesus looked



at him and said two words: "Follow me." Matthew rose, leaving his pieces of silver to follow Christ. His new name in Christ, Matthew, means "Gift of God." St. Matthew was the first to write down our Lord's teaching and the account of His life.

Tips from parishioners

- **Coffee grounds** are rich in potassium and nitrogen but first mix with organic or seasoned manure before lightly forking into the garden. Great for acidic plants especially roses and strawberries but not tomatoes!
- Broken up egg shells are great to keep snails and slugs away. Just make a circle of the shells around the plant foliage.
- Saving water When we want hot water we may not have it instantly hot. And instead of running off the cold water down the plug hole - catch the cold water in a bucket or a two litre plastic recyclable milk bottle. Use the water on the garden! It is amazing how much water we can save and help the garden!
- Potted Cyclamen loses its leaves. Dig a hole wider and deeper than the pot in a well drained and shady spot. Make sure the drainage holes in the base of the pot are well open before placing it in the hole. The top soil should be at the same level as the soil in the pot and not watered. The cyclamen will regenerate its leaves early in the next winter if kept moist. Attention DIY painters!
 - **Goolwa Waste and Recycling Depot** now accepts a variety of unwanted paint products through the Paintback program, which repurposes the paint for a variety of industrial applications and recycles paint tins.

COMPLIANCE WITH COVID-19 REGULATIONS

(Current from 9 September, 2021) • Places of Worship are restricted to 3 people per 4 square metres with social distancing of 1.5 metres. The number of people at a Private Activity has increased from 50 people to 150 people, provided density requirements are met. If more than 50 people are present, there must be an independent COVID Marshal. QR codes and/or handwritten logs are essential.

• Wearing of masks is mandatory. Wearing of masks in parish offices is strongly recommended.

• Attendees at indoor religious services may sing during worship and members of choirs or chorus groups may perform or rehearse indoors, if they wear masks while doing so.

GOSPEL Mark 9:30-37

After leaving the mountain Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest. So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

BACKGROUND ON TODAY'S GOSPEL READING

In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus again predict his passion, death, and Resurrection to his disciples. The setting here is important. Jesus and his disciples are preparing to journey through Galilee, a Jewish territory in which Jesus has already encountered problems with the Pharisees. Perhaps this is why Mark indicates that Jesus was trying to journey in secret. In predicting his passion, Jesus is acknowledging the danger they will face and is trying to preparing his disciples for it. Yet Mark tells us that the disciples did not understand what Jesus was saving and were afraid to ask what he meant. Such hesitation on the part of the disciples is not characteristic behaviour. Peter had no fear about rebuking Jesus in last week's Gospel. Perhaps this is an indication that the disciples were aware that a new situation was emerging.

Mark paints a vivid picture in today's Gospel. Having arrived at Capernaum,

Jesus and his disciples enter a house. In this private place, Jesus asks his disciples about the argument they had while they were journeying. Again, the disciples are uncharacteristically silent and afraid to answer. They have been found out. Jesus then summons the Twelve, whom Mark identified earlier in his Gospel as those chosen by Jesus to preach and to drive out demons. To this select group of disciples, Jesus teaches that those who would be first in God's kingdom must be servants of all.

Jesus then calls forward a child and teaches the Twelve that to receive a child in Jesus' name is to receive both Jesus and the One who sent him. We might easily fail to understand the significance of this action. In firstcentury Palestine, children were without status or power, possessing no legal rights. In this action, Jesus is teaching his disciples and us that when we serve the least ones among us, we serve Jesus himself. Who are the people without power or status in our society that Jesus is calling us to serve? Do we do so willingly? Jesus teaches that God's judgment of us will be based on this criterion alone.
