Since August last year, the Maintenance Group has fitted flexible hoses to the gas bottles, replaced a toilet suite in the ladies toilet and the wall keysafe at the annex door, timber surrounds at the base of the pillars inside the church were refurbished, small organ power point replaced, Sacristy Room painted, Vinnies shed skylights replaced, quarry sand spread across church front yard. In addition, we arranged for contractors to do some heavy pruning and removal of a tree limb in the grounds and had the City Council cut back the street tree that protruded far into Church property. SAINT THOMAS, APOSTLE Feast Day 3rd July



Poor Thomas! He made one remark and has been branded as "Doubting Thomas" ever

since. But if he doubted, he also believed. He made what is certainly the most explicit statement of faith in the New Testament: "My Lord and My God!" and, in so expressing his faith, gave Christians a prayer that will be said till the end of time. He also occasioned a compliment from Jesus, to all later Christians: "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29) (Excerpt: Franciscan media)

BLESSED PETER TOROT Feast Day 7th July

Peter Torot lived on a tropical island near Rabaul, in what is now known as Papua New Guinea. He was born in the village of Rakunai, where his father was the tribal chief. Peter's parents, like many other villagers, were catechised and later baptised by Missionaries of the Sacred Heart.

When the Japanese invaded PNG the military police cracked down on Christian

worship and religious gatherings. They decided the islanders should return to polygamy and Peter objected to this. Peter was arrested in the spring of 1945 and was confined to a cave. He was given an injection, his nose and ears were plugged. When Peter began to convulse, his mouth was covered and the soldiers held him down until he suffocated. Peter was a martyr for the faith.

ST. MARIA GORETTI Feast Day 6th July 1890 – 1902

St. Maria Goretti is best known for her commitment to purity and the courageous defence of her faith at the young age of eleven that made her willing to undergo death rather than participate in a sin against God. She is also remarkable for the forgiveness she willingly granted her attacker as she lay on her deathbed. (Excerpt: Catholic News Agency)



Anyone who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me. Anyone who finds his life will lose it; anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it.

'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me.

'Anyone who welcomes a prophet will have a prophet's reward; and anyone who welcomes a holy man will have a holy man's reward.

'If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.'



EXPLORING THE WORD

To follow Jesus means putting other important relationships second. It means taking up the cross and perhaps facing the same fate that Jesus met – persecution, suffering, death – but remaining faithful leads to eternal life. In ancient times, a person's agent was seen to be the person themselves and here, Jesus is giving great dignity to the apostolate of following him by saying it derives from the Father himself through Jesus.

In the Scriptures, a prophet is a person who speaks for God. To be a prophet, one must have a very clear understanding of what God wants and the task is to transmit that message to the people. There are many instances of the people rejecting the message of the prophets. Some scholars translate 'holy man' as 'just man' or someone who does the will of God. To recognise and welcome the truth is to be a disciple. The cost of discipleship may be high but the rewards are great.

SHARING THE TRADITION For the first three centuries of the Christian era, to be initiated by Baptism into the new, spiritual family of Christ was to risk one's life. Christianity was a minority religion in a predominantly pagan world. At various stages, persecutions were carried out against Christians. To remain faithful at such times was very difficult and those who chose Christ were strong indeed. After the Emperor Constantine was converted early in the fourth century, Christianity became the state religion of the Roman Empire. People flocked to be converted, not always for the right reasons. Numbers grew rapidly and the Church spread and blossomed. With the gains in number, however, came the possibility of a loss in quality of conviction. Were people really as committed to following Jesus as those earlier, persecuted Christians had been?

The modern western world is a very secularised place, where God has been replaced in some people's hearts by other gods – the quest for profit, individualism, consumerism. Pope John Paul II referred to these things as a 'new idolatry'. Numbers of practicing Catholics are reducing in many Western countries and we may become a minority again. Today many Christians face persecution of a different kind.

DID YOU KNOW?

- At the time Matthew's Gospel was being written, Jewish families were being literally split by those who were making the decision to move away from traditional Jewish beliefs and follow Christ.
- Even though family relationships are vitally important, 'the first vocation of a Christian is to follow Christ'.
