FIRST READING Wisdom 18:6-9

That night had been foretold to our ancestors, so that, once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage.

This was the expectation of your people, the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies; for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes you made us glorious by calling us to you.

The devout children of worthy men offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord: that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike; and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of the fathers.

Psalm 32:1, 12, 18-20, 22 *Happy the people the Lord has* chosen to be his own.

SECOND READING Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the



promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted. as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

All these died in faith, before receiving any of the things that had been promised, but they saw them in the far distance and welcomed them, recognising that they were only strangers and nomads on earth. People who use such terms about themselves make it quite plain that they are in search of their real homeland. They can hardly have meant the country they came from, since they had the opportunity to go back to it; but in fact they were longing for a better homeland, their heavenly homeland. That is why God is not ashamed to be called their God, since he has founded the city for them.

It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead; and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead. (Continued page 4)

ST. MARY OF THE CROSS MacKILLOP Feast Day 8th August Mary Helen MacKillop



(15 January 1842 -8 August 1909), also known as Saint Mary of the Cross, was an Australian nun who, together with Father Julian

Tenison Woods, founded the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart and a number of schools and welfare institutions throughout Australasia with an emphasis on education for the poor, particularly in country areas. She was declared a Saint by Pope Benedict XVI on the 17th October 2010.

ST. LAWRENCE

Feast Day 10th August Around the year A.D.258, the Prefect of Rome, a greedy pagan, thought the Church had a great



fortune hidden away. So he ordered Lawrence to bring the Church's treasure to him. The Saint said he would, in three days. Then he went through the city and gathered together all the poor and sick people supported by the Church . When he showed them to the Prefect, he said: "This is the Church's treasure!" In great anger, the Prefect condemned Lawrence to a slow, cruel death. He was burned alive.

ST. CLARE Feast Day 11th August

Patron of eye disease, goldsmiths, laundry, television. Birth : 1194. Death : 1253

St. Clare was the foundress of the "Poor Clares" order of

nuns. After listening to St. Francis of Assisi preach, she was moved to imitate him and serve Jesus. She and her fellow nuns wore no shoes, ate no meat, lived in a poorhouse and kept silent for most of the time.

St. Clare was designated as the patron saint of television in 1958 by Pope Pious XII, because when St. Clare was very ill, she could not attend Mass and was, reportedly, able to see and hear it on the wall of her room.

In 1804 a change was made in the rule of the Poor Clares, originally a contemplative order, permitting these religious to take part in active work

Poor Clares came to Sydney, Australia, in 1951 at the invitation of the Australian province of the Franciscans. Five sisters from the historic monastery of Nuns' Island, Galway settled in the Franciscan parish of Waverley.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION *Mt 24:42, 44*

Alleluia, alleluia! Be watchful and ready: you know not when the Son of Man is coming. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Luke 12:32-48

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom.

'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming," and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut

him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.

The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When a man has had a great deal given him, a great deal will be demanded of him; when a man has had a great deal given him on trust, even more will be expected of him.'



DID YOU KNOW?

- Under Roman custom, a day was reckoned from midnight to midnight and the night divided into four watches. Jewish custom was to reckon a day from sunset to sunset and the night was divided into three watches.
- A Jewish wedding consisted of the groom going in procession to the home of the bride where the wedding took place and a feast was held. After this celebration, the groom returned to his own home with his bride to begin their life together.
