

PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL UPDATE.

Renewing Church Together.

Three submissions from parishioners were received and discussed. Thanks to those who used the suggestion boxes in the Church foyers to provide input into this important parish activity. We would appreciate any further thoughts and suggestions via the suggestion boxes.

Over the coming weeks, representatives from the various parish groups and ministries will be approached to speak for a few minutes at Masses about the work of the ministry they undertake. There is a lot of activity around the Parish and community that is unknown and unrecognised. The PPC feels it is important to let the wider parish know of this work.

The PPC acknowledged some of the work in the community made by St Vincent De Paul and Knights of the Southern Cross. Vinnies is planning a Christmas lunch for the needy and sponsor the provision of breakfast to students at a Goolwa primary school. Knights pick up bakery products daily and deliver to needy families, Goolwa Primary school and other charitable outlets. If you know of anyone in the community who needs help, please contact a St Vincent De Paul member.

At our next meeting we will be looking further into characteristic 6 "_The parish witnesses to God's love for all the creatures of the earth." When the community gathers for Eucharist, we bring the whole creation with us. We pray at the beginning of the Third Eucharistic Prayer – "All you have created rightly gives you praise". Pope Francis says: "Joined to the incarnate Son, present in the Eucharist, the whole cosmos gives thanks to God. Indeed the Eucharist itself is an act of cosmic love." (Laudato Si, par. 236). He tells us that we are all called to ecological conversion. (Laudato Si, par. 217)' and this is a challenge in our parish life. School and parish can participate together in this conversion, and witness to it, in their use of resources, like water, and in many other ways, such as by using solar power, recycling, and supporting community gardens and tree planting. SAINT PIO OF PIETRELCINA Feast Day 23rd September (1887 – 1968)



Padre Pio was the first priest to bear the stigmata — the holy wounds of Christ — just like St. Francis of Assisi. Saint Pio is a man who

healed literally thousands — while he was still alive; who could read souls — knowing in case after case exactly what a person in Confession had done; who was seen in dozens of cases in bilocation (appearing far from where he actually was). There were accounts that defy the belief of even the most ardent believer: a sighting of him at the Vatican, even though he never left the San Giovanni monastery; the transfiguration of his face into that of Jesus' during the Consecration; a worker named Giovanni Savino who lost an eye that later materialized under the bandages after Pio visited him in bilocation

Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes."

Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat" was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great.

If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'

EXPLORING THE WORD

At first reading, this text is very puzzling. How can dishonesty be so rewarded? The action in the text is easier to understand when we know something of how commerce was conducted at the time. According to Jewish Law, it was not permissible to charge interest. To get around this, the practice developed of increasing


the original debt to cover what would have been a normal interest rate. What the cunning steward has done is to reduce the debt to the level of the original loan. The Master will be paid his due according to the Law, but no more. If the Master complained about this action, his sin would come to light. The real criticism in this text is directed to those who have been entrusted with the riches of God's kingdom and have not used them well. The point is that all who are called to share the riches of the kingdom must commit themselves to careful administration of those inestimable treasures. This is much more important than administering the riches of this

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Just like the steward in this story, we are entrusted with God-given talents and we must use them in a way that will yield genuine riches. Increasingly in the modern world, we are also aware that we must be good stewards of God's creation to ensure its riches for future generations.

DID YOU KNOW?

- One of the dominant themes in Luke's Gospel is the right use of money and the need to beware of becoming distracted by it from the pursuit of God.
- In Jesus' time, wealth was seen as reward for virtue so these words were a great challenge.
