SAINTS SIMON AND JUDE, APOSTLES




Feast Day October 28th As in the case of all the apostles except for Peter, James and John, we are faced with men who are really unknown, and we are struck by the fact that

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Have you ever read something that stopped you dead in your tracks? Made you pause and reflect and cause a certain change within your heart and mind? Today's Gospel is most definitely one of those reads. It made me re-assess myself, it forced me to look at myself in a way I never have before. I had to think about, who I was in light of the Gospel. What is Jesus trying to communicate to me? A lot of things came to mind, and I thought I can associate with the tax collector, but more often than not, I am the Pharisee. And this is not an easy thing to admit. It is never easy to have your faults displayed so openly, as if someone put a mirror in front of you and showed you what you really are. This mirror is unlike any other, this mirror is Jesus, and He can see you for what you are; there is no way to trick or con him. There are times that I find myself judging others for ridiculous things, but who am I to judge?

I make no excuses. I am aware of my sinfulness, and that is what this Gospel is reminding us of. As it says "for whoever make themselves out to be great will be humbled, and whoever humble themselves will be raised". If you want to read something before the Sacrament of Reconciliation, this should be the passage. As you reflect on its words, you are made aware of the necessity to constantly turn to God and repent and to realise just how much you need Him.

Dear friends, I read a quote recently that said "if you can kneel before God, you can stand before anyone". And this certainly rings true. People are easy to deceive, but God however, is not one of these people. But, unlike people, He forgives fully, and completely wipes away all your sins, because with the Lord "there is mercy and plentiful redemption". Always be aware of your sins, sometimes you can be tricked into thinking that they are not there at all. Turn to Jesus in prayer today and ask Him to heal you and to have mercy on you. He will never let you down.



DID YOU KNOW?

- It is always important to look at who the characters are in the parables of Jesus.
- Pharisees were deeply religious laymen who observed the law very closely and met together regularly for prayer and table fellowship.
- Tax collectors were despised because their job gave them opportunity to cheat and defraud the people and also because they cooperated with the Roman oppressors. Their contact with the gentiles made them ritually unclean. No wonder this tax collector 'stood some distance away'. The Pharisees would have believed he had no right to be in the Temple at all.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

This Gospel really asks us to think about what constitutes right worship. Is God impressed by words and outward show alone when the human heart is harbouring thoughts of hatred or vengeance? This parable would indicate that God is more impressed by humility and a recognition of our own need for healing.
