ST MARIA GORETTI, Virgin, Martyr Feast Day 6th July

Maria Goretti lived in poverty with her family in Italy. When she was 11 years old, she was stabbed 14 times by a 19 year old neighbour, Alessandro Serenelli, because she resisted his advances. As she lay dying in the hospital, Maria forgave her killer and prayed that he would repent and turn to God.



After serving six years of a thirty year sentence, Alessandro began having dreams in which Maria appeared to him. He began to repent of his sins. When he was released from prison, he entered a monastery. He and Maria's mother and siblings were together at her canonisation in 1950.

BLESSED PETER TO ROT Feast Day 7th July

Peter lived on a tropical island in the Coral Sea, in what is now known as Papua New Guinea.



He studied to become a catechist and worked with the missionaries to spread the faith.

In 1942, the world was at war, and Japan occupied Peter's island. When the missionary priests were imprisoned Peter worked even harder and took the Eucharist to priests in prison.

Peter was arrested in the spring of 1945 and was confined to a cave.

A doctor arrived and gave him an injection and something to drink and plugged his nose and ears. When Peter began to convulse, the doctor covered his mouth and the soldiers held him down until he suffocated. Soon the rest of the prison camp found out what happened to Peter.

The next morning, the Japanese guards said he had died of an infection, but the crowd that attended Peter's funeral knew the truth. They knew Peter was a martyr for the faith.

Peter To Rot was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1995. The ceremony took place in Papua New Guinea.

him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him.

Now there was a woman who had suffered from a haemorrhage for twelve years; after long and painful treatment under various doctors, she spent all she had without being any the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him through the crowd and touched his cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had told herself 'I shall be well again.' And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"' But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at his feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,' he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint.'

While he was still speaking some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking

the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'Little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Jairus, as an official of the synagogue, belonged to one of the groups who were traditionally deeply suspicious and disapproving of Jesus. Here however, Jairus' faith is contrasted with the lack of faith of the onlookers who simply laugh at Jesus. His faith is rewarded.
- For Jesus to lay hands upon a young woman of twelve years of age (old enough to be betrothed) would have been seen as a scandalous act. Jesus breaks through the restrictions of social norm to bring life.
