Job began to speak:

Lying in bed I wonder, 'When will it be day?'

FOR ALL THOSE WHO ATTEND MASS AT **GOOLWA**

Our Church is like a number of Catholic Church buildings constructed in the late 70s early 80s in that the tabernacle is placed to



the far right of the main altar. We still have Christ on the Cross at the back of the altar and we suggest when we enter God's house that we bow or genuflect towards the cross to acknowledge the suffering Christ dying for the sins of the world and also show the same adoration towards the tabernacle where of course the body of Christ is placed 24/7 and a place that people use for private prayer. If we go to a place to visit we always acknowledge our host, so when we enter God's house it is suggested that we show Our Lord the same courtesy.

When the church was built in the late 80s the then parish priest, the late

Fr. Kevin O'Loughlin, asked the architects of the church not to show the agony of the cross but to have Christ reaching out to the world, calling all to him and showing his love for all, being prepared to die for all. I think they got it right.

SAINT PAUL MIKI AND COMPANIONS, Feast Day 6th February (b. c.1562 – d.1597)



Paul Miki, a
Japanese Jesuit,
and his twenty-five
companions were
martyred in
Nagasaki, Japan,
the first martyrs of
East Asia to be
canonized. Their

executioners were astounded upon seeing their joy at being associated to the Passion of Christ. They were crucified simultaneously on a hill, now known as the Holy Mountain, overlooking Nagasaki. Among them were priests, brothers, laymen, Franciscans, Jesuits and members of the Secular Franciscan Order. There were catechists, doctors, simple artisans and servants, old men and innocent children - all united in a common faith and love for Jesus and his church. Beatified in 1627, the martyrs of Japan were finally canonized in 1862. *Catholic Culture*

DID YOU KNOW?

- In Capernaum, archaeological excavations have uncovered a house, close by the synagogue, which has ancient inscriptions suggesting it is the house of Peter.

- The Jewish Sabbath begins at sunset on Friday and lasts until sunset on Saturday. As the day of God's rest, work was not permitted. That is why Jesus only begins his work of healing after sunset.

Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

LOOKING FOR JESUS (Mark 1:29-39)

One of Jesus' first acts in Mark's gospel is to liberate a man from a demon, as we heard last week. Next, Jesus tames a fever; and by nightfall, everyone is after him. Is this a surprise? Not to anyone who's ever suffered. If there's a miracle cure for our pain, we'd all like to have a piece of it. Jesus, for his part, doesn't seem to mind. He gets down to business and sends those diseases and demons packing.

The next day, Jesus moves on to the next town, and the same thing happens. The world is full of opportunities to encounter Job, and one village is as good as another. Job, unhappily, lives in all of them. The early success of Jesus' ministry owes itself to the rampant misery in

the world and our desperate desire for an answer or a cure. For those who'd given up the hope of happiness, the coming of Jesus was a new shot at life.

For believers today, the news is just as exciting. Jesus is ready to reach into our lives and liberate us from the demons that enslave us. Jesus is the only real healer, making even death itself a king without subjects. Though our misery runs deep and happiness becomes a memory, Jesus can restore our peace. No wonder so many are still after him. *GPBS eNews*
