

FIRST READING

Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48

As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up,' he said 'I am only a man after all!'

Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.'

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.


THE MEMORARE

GUIDELINES FOR THE SISTER PARISH RELATIONSHIP

The Victor Harbor Goolwa Parish sponsors an outreach mission to the overseas parish of Comoro, in Timor-Leste.

Communication with the Comoro parish is managed on behalf of the Victor Harbor Goolwa Parish by a working party that comprises representatives from Victor Harbor and Goolwa Mass centres. The working party is responsible to the Parish Pastoral Council and reports regularly to this group. The working party communicates directly with representatives from the Comoro parish.

Development projects in Comoro are proposed by parishioners in Comoro and confirmed by their parish priest. Proposals are then submitted to the working group.

Projects may be fully or partly funded.

Responsibility for managing development

projects is undertaken by representatives from the Comoro parish. Victor Harbor and Goolwa parishioners are kept informed about development projects in Comoro by occasional reports in the parish bulletin and/ or verbal reports from members of the working party.

The working party on behalf of the Victor Harbor Goolwa Parish engages in fund-raising and accepts donations in support of development projects in Comoro that are approved by the working group and the Parish Pastoral Council.

All major expenditure and accompanying documentation for Comoro is submitted to the Parish Pastoral Council for approval and confirmed by the Victor Harbor Goolwa parish priest.

Minor expenditure is approved by the working group. All funds raised by the Victor Harbor Goolwa Parish for our sister parish in Comoro go to Comoro in full for project assistance.

An annual statement of receipts and expenses is submitted to the Parish Pastoral Council by the working group.

Regular visits to and from Comoro are encouraged to further develop positive communication and personal relationships between members of each parish.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The heart of today's gospel lies in Jesus repeating himself: 'Love one another'. The model for this love is the love that Jesus showed towards all those who follow him. Jesus has changed the way in which God relates to human beings. We are no longer servants of God but are drawn into deep intimacy and friendship through the Son. This new relationship is not dependent on our choice or will. God has chosen us and we are now commissioned to bear fruit, fruit that will last.

The Christian command to love is not a vague feeling of good will; it is a love which suffers all, and may demand great sacrifice. The command to love as Jesus loved may be the most difficult test of our Christianity. This is how the presence of Jesus is experienced even in his absence.

GOSPEL (John 15:9-17)

Jesus said to his disciples:

'As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy be complete. This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you. I shall not call you servants any more, because a servant does not know his master's business; I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. You did not choose me: no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last; and then the Father will give you anything you ask him in my name. What I command you is to love one another.'



I CALL YOU FRIENDS

Jesus sets the ultimate standard for love: putting your life on the line for your friends. Most of us don't go anywhere near that far. I have a physically challenged friend who's greatly loved within our parish and school community. Everyone declares how much he means to them, and how they would do anything for him. But there are things that few will actually do. Sitting with him is one thing; bathing him is another. Bringing over dinner is okay, but cleaning potties is not. Some will only come by when he's particularly well; when he's especially frail and helpless, some can't bear the sight of his suffering. Each of us has limits on how far we're willing to go with love, how much responsibility we're prepared to assume. None of us has a perfect record, and no one shows signs of the "best love" that Jesus models.

Yet Jesus calls us friends anyway. Even though he's a better friend to us than we'll ever be in return. Jesus takes our imperfect love and breaks it, blesses it, and passes it around like Eucharist to a hungry world. Jesus multiplies our little fragments of love and makes them sufficient. Our love may not be perfect, but that's no excuse to withhold what


we've got. Jesus will make it what it needs to be. Our task is to offer it.

CREATE COMMUNITY ONLINE

I'm grateful the pandemic didn't happen 10 years ago – before the ability to meet virtually was widespread. While I had already been working remotely for many years, it made staying in touch with loved ones easier – and for the first time, I created new relationships solely online. One of them was with a spiritual director. Having this new friend guide me in my spiritual journey, especially through the COVID years like we had, helped me enormously to recognise God's presence and action in my life and discern how to respond.

She and I often talked about how much we missed Mass, but I also shared with her my disappointment in my neighbourhood parish – its lacklustre spirit, problem priests, and comfortable congregation. I told her I stayed there to try to make it better. "You deserve to be fed too," she said, and together we prayed for that.

Very quickly, I found pockets of people all over the country – a Tuesday evening prayer group, a Sunday Liturgy of the Word – to connect with via Zoom. These new faith communities nourished me spiritually in ways I didn't realise I needed. Even now, since things have returned to "normal", we still meet online and share from time to time – and my cup is more full than it used to be when it comes to loving one another.
