OUR VISION:


To build a faith community centred on the loving relationship of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, expressed in personal lives and communal parish activities.

To the disappointment of the people of Castel Gandolfo, the hill town south of Rome, Pope Francis has never used the papal villa there as a summer retreat from Rome's heat, breaking a tradition that began in 1626 and was interrupted only by war. SAINT BENEDICT Feast Day 11th July (b. c.480 d.547)



St. Benedict was born at Nursia in Umbria in about 480 and educated in Rome, but soon left the world to live a solitary life at Subiaco. After living as a

hermit in a mountain cave for two years, he had acquired such a reputation that disciples came in numbers to join him and important Roman families entrusted him with the education of their children. He organized a form of monastic life in twelve small monasteries.

Under his guidance, as abbot, the monks vowed to seek God and devoted themselves to work and prayer. A few years later St. Benedict left the district of Subiaco to found the great abbey of Monte Cassino on the heights of Campania. There he wrote his Rule in which are wonderfully combined the Roman genius and the monastic wisdom of the Christian East. St. Benedict died in 547. Catholic Culture

'Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light.'



ALL THIS STUFF (Matthew 11: 25 - 30)

Consider the last time you struggled with a too-heavy suitcase or had to pack and move your possessions to another address. Compare that with the yoke of Christ: the burden of love we carry in our hearts. Which experience is better, more life-giving, more real?

The yoke of Christ is the mandate to love, even when it means sacrifice, even if it involves suffering. It's not the silly, romantic love that shows up in all the movies, but the day-to-day love of parents for children, the plodding fidelity of spouses, the single-hearted devotion of artists to their craft, the constancy of friends who support us even when the news is bad. It's a mirror of the love God has for us, and when we're faithful in love, we open a window to that greater love for those around us to experience.


Love is a burden; but it's a lovely one to bear. Anyone who has loved, in sickness and in health, for richer for poorer, knows that some burdens are a privilege to carry. If our love is tied up in the things of this world, we'll be dragging that overstuffed suitcase around and wondering why we ache so. If our hearts are free to love others, Christ will carry that love to places we haven't dreamed of.

GIVE ME A BREAK

I have a problem: I struggle to rest. Some people don't get to rest — because they have too much work and too many personal responsibilities. That's often the case with me, too, but even when I know I should take time to rest, or am simply blessed with the opportunity, I have a hard time doing so.

I was even an insomniac for a while – how could I sleep when there was so much I needed to get done? I managed to kick that problem, but I'm still trying to figure out how to slow down, or even do nothing at all. Prayer helps – being quiet and still in conversation with God. I took up knitting, and the repetitiveness is very calming. I got a kitten, who insists I sometimes simply hold her. I tried yoga – also helpful, but there are times in the practice when I am supposed to do nothing but breathe. Impossible, I told the instructor, because I'm not doing anything. We discussed my difficulty. "You know," she said, "you deserve to be happy". That's it, isn't it? We're all worthy, by God's grace, of the peace and happiness of rest. We just have to breathe in God's love to experience

Ponder: How do you spend your love, on people or things? Are the burdens you carry difficult, or easy? Make a decision to simplify. Be drastic! Give away one-third of what owns you: books, clothes, CDs, money, or some other item that's collected around you. Contemplate what the new space in your life means, and what it's for.
