

FIRST READING

Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

Peter said to the people: 'You are Israelites, and it is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our ancestors, who has glorified his servant Jesus, the same Jesus you handed over and then disowned in the presence of Pilate after Pilate had decided to release him. It was you who accused the Holy One, the Just One, you who demanded the reprieve of a murderer while you killed the prince of life. God, however, raised him from the dead, and to that fact we are the witnesses.

'Now I know, brothers, that neither you nor your leaders had any idea what you were really doing; this was the way God carried out what he had foretold, when he said through all his prophets that his Christ would suffer. Now you must repent and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out?'

THE EARLY CHURCH



At Masses all through the Easter season, the first reading at Mass will be from the Acts of the Apostles.

These stories of heroism, controversies, persecutions and miracles all testify to the continued presence of the Risen Christ in the world, through the lives of his disciples, and the actions of the Holy Spirit. All of this should be an encouragement and a sign of hope for us today. Despite war, violence, climate change, personal struggles, God has not abandoned us, nor left us to our own devices. The Risen Saviour is still with us. These 50 days of Easter ask us to reflect on his presence, and - even in the face of danger or fear - to live with joy.

THREAT TO FAITH-BASED SCHOOLS

Faith-based schools currently have discretion to positively preference staff that adhere to that religion and its practices. Various faith leaders including the Archbishop of Sydney have written to the Prime Minister:

We expect you to uphold your election commitment to maintain the right of religious educational institutions to preference people of their own faith.... We ask you to continue to work towards a bipartisan approach to this matter...in consultation with religious communities.

Signed, Most Rev. Anthony Fisher OP Catholic Archbishop of Sydney and 41 other Faith Leaders.




DID YOU KNOW?

- The disciples referred to in this Gospel are the two who had been fleeing from Jerusalem towards Emmaus when they encountered Jesus on the road. They returned to be witnesses of their encounter with the risen Christ.
- Luke also wrote the Acts of the Apostles. His gospel is the story of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem to the cross and resurrection. Acts is the story of the gospel spreading from Jerusalem to 'all the nations'. A unifying theme in Luke is that of 'journey'.

Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have.' And as he said this he showed them his hands and feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' And they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes.

Then he told them, 'This is what I meant when I said, while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses, in the Prophets and in the Psalms has to be fulfilled.' He then opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'So you see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this.



NOT A GHOST

Some people are born with the knack of putting names and faces together and never forgetting that connection. That is a real blessing to have in life. It endears you to people instantly and can also be an effective tool in business and politics. There are also those who can continue to put the correct name to a face years after the last encounter, overcoming the obstacles that passing times adds to someone's appearance. This seems to border on genius.

There is no worse feeling than when someone comes up to you and unexpectedly says, "You remember me, don't you?" You have to quickly start to catalogue from where you might know this person, looking and listening for anything at all identifiable that might help. There's a great feeling of accomplishment of recognition as the correct name comes into focus. If not, you have a choice to either fake it, hoping that further clues may help you figure it out. Or you might just give up and say, "Your face is familiar. Give me a name."

The disciples of Jesus in the upper

room found it hard to recognise the risen Jesus. They thought he was a ghost. The two who had met him on the way to Emmaus did not immediately recognise him either. Only after the breaking of the bread, receiving Jesus in the Eucharist, did they fully recognise his presence in their lives.


