FIRST READING

Acts 14:21-27

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

Then the One sitting on the throne spoke: 'Now I am making the whole of creation new.'

SAINT CHRISTOPHER MAGALLANES Feast Day 21st May (1869 – 1927)



Saint Christopher
Magallanes was joined in
martyrdom by twenty-one
diocesan priests and three
devout laymen, all members
of the Cristeros movement,

who rose up in rebellion against the anti-Catholic Mexican government during the 1920s. Having erected a seminary at Totatiche, he secretly spread the Gospel and ministered to the people. Captured by government authorities, he was heard to shout from his jail cell: "I am innocent and I die innocent. I forgive with all my heart those responsible for my death, and I ask God that the shedding of my blood serve the peace of our divided Mexico." *Catholic Culture*

GOSPEL

John 13:31-35

When Judas had gone Jesus said:

'Now has the Son of Man been glorified, and in him God has been glorified.

If God has been glorified in him, God will in turn glorify him in himself, and will glorify him very soon.

'My little children, I shall not be with you much longer.

I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another.

By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

John's Gospel does not present a sentimental view of love. This is a type of love that is shown in service and sacrifice. It is difficult to choose to love when faced with hatred and anger. Jesus tells the disciples that all will know that they are his disciples because of the love they show for one another. This description of the early Christian community will be repeated in the Acts of the Apostles: "See how they love one another." Christian love is the hallmark of Christianity. We see it lived in the witness of the martyrs. We see it in the example of the lives of the saints. We see it in the holy women and men who live and love daily, making small and large sacrifices for others. Loyola Press

ALL THINGS NEW

One of my favourite movie moments occurs when in The Christmas Carol when Ebenezer Scrooge throws open his shutters on Christmas morning and looks out on the world with new eyes. His latenight encounters with the ghosts of Christmas past, present, and future had shaken his preconceived notions about what to value in life. After years of bitterness and hoarding, his heart was newly open and all the

world was wonderful.
No matter the season, I always think about Scrooge when I read the passage from the Book of Revelation, "Behold, I make all things new". When Scrooge awoke from his dream, nothing external in his life had changed. But because he had a change of heart, everything around him took on new meaning. Scrooge personifies the promise that all things can be made new.

How? Jesus offers a sure-fire way to experience a radical reorientation in our lives. "Love one another," he says. If you feel as if your life is in a rut, take Jesus' advice to heart. Look around you and respond to those you see with loving care. For when we view the world with the eyes of love and generosity, we will surely recognise all the love and generosity that has been showered on us. And rather than experiencing life as a land of want and deprivation, we will be spending our days in the land of abundance. And that's when all things will be made new.
