OUR VISION:


To build a faith community centred on the loving relationship of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, expressed in personal lives and communal parish activities.



SAINTS ANDREW DUNG-LAC (1791 - 1839) and COMPANIONS (d. 1820 – 1862)

Andrew Dung-Lac, a Catholic convert ordained to the priesthood, was one of 117



people martyred in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862. Although they died at different times, all were canonized by Pope John Paul II on June

19, 1988. Of the group, 96 were Vietnamese, 11 were Spaniards, and 10 were French. There were 8 bishops and 50 priests. Of the priests, 11 were Dominicans, 10 belonged to the Paris Mission Society, and the rest were diocesan priests plus one seminarian. Certain individual martyrs were mentioned by name in the process of canonization: one of whom was Andrew Dung-Lac, a diocesan priest ordained in 1823. The last of the martyrs were 17 laypersons, one of them a 9-year-old, executed in 1862. *Catholic Culture*

EXCERPTS FROM MARK LEANEY'S REPORT ON COMORO AT THE PARISH ASSEMBLY

Victor Harbor/Goolwa parish pulls together at an average age of 79 years! How is it possible that this age group can be so productive?

Over a period of three years much faith and good will have actually produced amazing results on the ground. A major factor in this international relationship is that it is not top down. The direction is at the instigation of the Timorese of Maria Auxiladora (Mary Help of Christians) Parish in Comoro. It is they who are pivotal in the process and who are responsible for successful project outcomes and their sustainability. It is very much a collaborative affair.

So back to the "oldies"..."Sure we get tired. I can't do as much these days ". The fact remains that by the efforts of a few really well-intentioned people, in excess of \$60,000 (\$45,000 couple donation) has been raised to actualise two extremely worthwhile project entities. These few "oldies ", have listened to the Cry of the Poor. I sum it up this way. By always putting our best foot forward, and through our heartfelt intentions, our faith and the love of God will shine through.

(Continued from page 1) received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

'Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made."

'His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

'Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

'Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."'

FAITHFUL IN SMALL MATTERS (Matthew 25: 14 - 30)

I was talking to a group of small children about the gifts God had given them. One girl seemed unconvinced. Her older sister, she told me with dewy-eyed admiration, had all the talent in the family: intelligence, athletic ability, and creativity. She herself, however, had none.

On the contrary, I assured her, she had many gifts of her own. She had a generous love for her sister, a pleasant personality, a warm smile, and a way of making people happy to talk with her. These were talents from God, too, and I urged her to name other things she was good at that were less obvious than these.

Some weeks later I was at home, having a bad spell of writer's block, and began to feel frustrated with the blank computer screen. Going to the mailbox to retrieve my letters, I noticed one printed in pencil. It was from the little girl I had spoken with, and inside the envelope was a crayon drawing with these simple words pencilled alongside: You have talents. God created you to use your talents. NAME THEM. In a moment, my sense of failure was gone, replaced by a child's wonderful courage. She gave the story of the talents back to me multiplied, and I got back to work exhilarated.
