when the new St. Johns at Goolwa was constructed. He said once it was the last thing he wanted to be involved in but got through it all.



He was responsible for the design of the Cross of Christ on the back wall of the church.

He requested that it not highlight the terrible sufferings of Christ, but depict Jesus reaching out to the world, showing his love for all people. After Fr. Kevin left our parish he became parish priest of Lower North Adelaide, which included the position of chaplain at the Women's and Children's Hospital. This was exactly what he was looking for in his ministry and his work received acclamation from many people. To make children and their families relaxed he would dress in bright clothes and wear Disney ties with Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck on them. He was available over 24 hours and would always come in an emergency. Peter Goers, the ABC radio commentator, who often visited the hospital, once said Fr. Kevin was one of the greatest men he had ever met. Vale Fr. Kevin.

PARISH LAND ASSET SALE AND CEMETERY UPDATE

On the 8th May 2023 the Parish received Archdiocesan approval to sell the 4 blocks of land at 54-60 Tottenham Court Pt Elliot. The rear boundary of the blocks will be fenced off from the Cemetery in the next couple of weeks and then the land will be advertised for public sale via a local Real Estate Agent. Note: On the 10th June notices were placed in the Advertiser, online and at the Cemetery, advising the public of the proposed closure of the Cemetery on 31st December 2024. Parish Finance Committee.

HISTORY

The land was purchased in 1864 and a Catholic Church, St John the Evangelist, was consecrated in Pt Elliot that year. A convent was also built at the same time which was used by the Sisters of Saint Joseph.

While St John's Church was demolished in 1936, the cemetery remained 'active', with 67 burials recorded and a number of unmarked graves at the site noted. The last burial was more than 50 years ago in August 1972. Southern Cross

CONFIRMATION - CHANGES

Most of us would have been confirmed at around the age of 12 or 13, well after our First Holy Communion. Some people



may believe that this is "how it was always done" and wonder why the familiar pattern has recently changed.

In the early church, Initiation consisted of

- 1. Immersion in water (Baptism)
- 2. laying on of hands and anointing with chrism by the bishop **(Confirmation)** and finally
- 3. joining the community for the first time at the Lord's table (**First Holy Communion**) all of which happened at the one ceremony.

For historical reasons, Confirmation became separated from First Holy Communion but has now been returned to its proper place.

Remember the date for Confirmation for our five young people on Wednesday August 9th at 7pm. Archbishop Patrick will celebrate.

And the servants said, "Do you want us to go and weed it out?" But he said, "No, because when you weed out the darnel you might pull up the wheat with it. Let them both grow till the harvest; and at harvest time I shall say to the reapers: First collect the darnel and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barn."

He put another parable before them: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is the biggest shrub of all and becomes a tree so that the birds of the air come and shelter in its branches.'

He told them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is like the yeast a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour till it was leavened all through.'

In all this Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables; indeed, he would never speak to them except in parables. This was to fulfil the prophecy:

I will speak to you in parables and expound things hidden since the foundation of the world.

Then, leaving the crowds, he went to the house; and his disciples came to him and said, 'Explain the parable about the darnel in the field to us.' He said in reply, 'The sower of the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed is the subjects of the kingdom; the darnel, the subjects of the evil one: the enemy who sowed them, the devil: the harvest is the end of the world; the reapers are the angels. Well then, just as the darnel is gathered up and burnt in the fire, so it will be at the end of time. The Son of Man will send his angels and they will gather out of his kingdom all things that provoke offences and all who do evil, and throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth. Then the virtuous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

MIGHT AND MERCY (Matthew 13: 24 - 43)

Just as power is used for good or harm, not all seeds are created equal. Jesus tells a story of good seed and bad, and how they grow up together in the harvest of the world. We experience this reality in the contents of our own hearts. We have wonderful, generous impulses; and also cruel, petty thoughts. We may be heroic in our love one day, and selfish the next. We forgive and withhold forgiveness. Our fields are waist-high in grain and thistles.

No wonder that good and bad grow up together in families; parishes are a mixture of charity and snobbery; politics is full of high-minded ideals and crude scandal. If we were surprised when nice people do things that are not nice, we have to look no further than this parable for the reason. Reasons are not excuses, of course. Jesus says even a tiny seed of good can create immense goodness. A bit of yeast makes the whole dough rise. The existence of evil is no reason to view it as inevitable. If I find within myself both good and evil, I have a responsibility to grow the grain and invite the Spirit to uproot the thistle in me

KIDS' CORNER

Have you ever seen a seed when it first sprouts? So tiny and tender! But sometimes a weed pops up nearby. If you try to pull it, you might hurt that little seedling too. Sometimes it's best to leave the weed alone until the seedling is stronger. In the parable, Jesus is telling us that sin can be all around us. It's not going to go away. We are all tempted – even Jesus was tempted. But if we put our trust in Jesus and nothing else, we don't have to worry about what happens around us. We will grow strong in Jesus' love.
