Mark 4:35-41

With the coming of evening, Jesus said to his disciples, 'Let us cross over to the other side.' Then it began to blow a gale and the waves were breaking into the boat so that it was almost swamped. But he was in the stern, his head on the cushion, asleep. They woke him and said to him, 'Master, do you not care? We are going down!' And he woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Quiet now! Be calm!' And the wind dropped, and all was calm again. Then he said to them, 'Why are you so frightened?

THE VOLUNTARY ASSISTED DYING BILL was passed through the ACT Legislative Assembly recently.

Canberra-Goulburn Archbishop Christopher Prowse said in a statement that the legislation was based on "mistaken compassion".

Compassion/love never kills but stays alongside the terminally ill sufferer. By closeness and tenderness, we accompany those who struggle with their finiteness and care for them," Archbishop Prowse said.

"Genuine palliative care is the best and most compassionate response to the dying. It is to be uppermost in our considerations. It is to be better resourced and widely available, especially for those in rural areas." Cathnews.

SAINTS PETER AND PAUL Feast Day 29th June (d. 67)



The two great Apostles, Peter and Paul, are the solid rock on which the Church is built. They are at the

origin of her faith and forever remain her protectors and her guides. Under God's providential guidance they were led to make Rome, the capital of the Empire, the centre of the Christian world whence should radiate the preaching of the Gospel.

Peter laboured in Rome as an apostle. The city's first bishop, he died there bound to a cross as a martyr under Nero, (67 A.D.). According to tradition he also was the first bishop of Antioch and the author of two letters, the first Christian encyclicals. St Paul arrived at Rome in the spring of 61 and passed the next two years in easy confinement before being released. The last years of the saint's life were devoted to missionary excursions, probably including Spain, and to revisiting his first foundations. In 66 he returned to Rome, was taken prisoner, and beheaded a year later in the Via Ostia on the spot where now stands the basilica bearing his name. His fourteen letters are a precious legacy; they afford a deep insight into a great soul. Catholic Culture

EARTHCARE MATTERS **MEET THE RESEARCHERS**



Parishioners who attended this meeting on Saturday were impressed with the enthusiasm and

expertise of the researchers who presented seven projects around the COORONG, LOWER LAKES, MURRAY MOUTH (CLLMM) AREA taking place over the next few years - looking at such topics as Water Birds and their habitat, increasing fresh water and salt water plants to absorb carbon, looking at the decline of mussels, the effects of climate change and other topics. Each project includes consultation with First Nations people to learn from their knowledge of the local environment. They are also involving groups who care for our area. It was good to see Leonie McCallum doing the Welcome to Country ceremony. The Centre is located on Barrage Road, Goolwa above Bombora Café where the Yacht Club used to be. 




DID YOU KNOW?

- 'The other side' refers to the eastern shore of the Sea of Galilee, This was known as pagan territory, the region of the Decapolis or the 'Ten cities', which were not part of the traditional lands of Israel.
- The Sea of Galilee was (and still is) notorious for storms which could blow up very quickly and be tempestuous.
- In Genesis 1, God brought order to the watery chaos at creation purely through his command. Here, Jesus does the same simply by verbal command.
- In Mark's gospel, the disciples are often portrayed as missing the point and failing to recognise who Jesus is!

How is it that you have no faith?' They were filled with awe and said to one another, 'Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.'



GOD UNLIMITED

(Mark 4: 35 - 41) Awake now, Jesus told the wind to pipe down and he said to the sea, "Quiet! Settle down!" The wind ran out of breath; the sea became smooth as glass. Jesus reprimanded the disciples, "Why are you such cowards? Don't you have any faith at all?" They were in absolute awe, staggered. "Who is this, anyway?" they asked. "Wind and sea at his beck and call!" (Mark 4:39-41)

Some scholars are fishermen, but it doesn't follow that all fishermen are scholars. Certainly, the guys who followed Jesus since Galilee didn't betray hours of brilliant learning. If they'd studied Scripture much, they might have recognised in Jesus' absolute control of the waters the divine authority displayed in the Old Testament. God sets limits on the waters in Genesis, and ever after the waters are under heavenly control. Think Noah and the ark, Moses and the Red Sea, Elijah and the long famine without rain, Job and the Voice from the Whirlwind, Jonah and the great fish, to name a few. Only God can wield power over the forces of chaos represented by water. If Jesus could do it too, then logic would suggest that Jesus had a special relationship to God.

But we can't really blame the first disciples for not recognising the power of God when they were up to their necks in it. How often do astonishing events come into our lives, and we just say, "What luck!" or "How talented I am!" never acknowledging the true source of grace.

GIVE YOURSELF A TIME OUT (Mark 4:35-41)

When she was a small child, my niece had a meltdown one day in the middle of the ornate foyer of her paediatrician's office in the city. She did not want to leave, but she didn't want to stay. She had entered the dreaded toddler contrarian mode that no amount of cajoling can deactivate. Her legs collapsed and she lay prostrate on the rich marble floor being traversed by beautifully clad businesspeople who stared at us with withering "can't you please control that child" looks.

At our wits' end, we dragged my precious darling niece across the foyer and out the door, where we lifted her kicking and screaming and put her into the car. Her Mum and Dad then let out a torrent of words that included phrases like "never so embarrassed," "big trouble," "no TV," "time out." Before their tirade was complete they looked into the rearview mirror and saw that my niece had fallen asleep. "Good God," we thought, "she was just tired. Why didn't we see that? Why didn't we handle the situation better?"

The words from Psalm 46 came to mind: "Be still and know that I am God," which are reminiscent of Jesus' command to the wind and sea in this week's gospel: "Quiet and still." I sat still for a long time, just listening to my niece's steady breathing. I realised I was the one who was in big trouble and in need of time out. I wish the inspiration had come sooner. Maybe next time it will. *GPBS eNews*
