- Strengthen bonds with indigenous people in our region.





FIRST READING

1 Kings 19:16,19-21

The Lord said to Elijah, 'Go, you are to anoint Elisha son of Shaphat, of Abel Meholah, as prophet to succeed you.'

Leaving there, Elijah came on Elisha son of Shaphat as he was ploughing behind twelve yoke of oxen, he himself being with the twelfth. Elijah passed near to him and threw his cloak over him. Elisha left his oxen and ran after Elijah. 'Let me kiss my father and mother, then I will follow you' he said. Elijah answered, 'Go, go back; for have I done anything to you?' Elisha turned away, took the pair of oxen and slaughtered them. He used the plough for cooking the oxen, then gave to his men, who ate. He then rose, and followed Elijah and became his servant.

Ps 15:1-2, 5, 7-11 You are my inheritance, O Lord.

SECOND READING

Galatians 5:1, 13-18

When Christ freed us, he meant us to remain free. Stand firm, therefore,

and do not submit again to the yoke of slavery. My brothers, you were called, as you know, to liberty; but be careful, or this liberty will provide an opening for self-indulgence. Serve one another, rather, in works of love, since the whole of the Law is summarised in a single command: Love your neighbour as yourself. If you go snapping at each other and tearing each other to pieces, you had better watch or you will destroy the whole community.

Let me put it like this: if you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you.

COMORO PARISH PROJECT UPDATE

Initially our parish asked the Comoro Parish to identify 3 possible projects from which our parish would choose one to fund.

We have received a request to help fund a multi-functional indoor sports facility.

Total cost would be \$US40,000.

After a long and serious consideration, we informed our Sister Parish that this is beyond our parish financial capacity. Since then we have informed the Comoro Parish that our current fund is available for a project under \$A10,000 and asked them to identify a project that would fulfil the most basic requirement of the parish.

CHANGE TO NATIONAL SCHOOL CHAPLAINCY POLICY

The Federal Government is ending the <u>compulsory religious aspect</u> of the \$60 million a year National School Chaplaincy Program, giving schools a <u>choice of chaplain or professionally qualified student welfare officer</u>.

SAINTS PETER AND PAUL Feast Day 29th June (d. 67)

The two great Apostles, Peter and Paul, are the solid rock on which the Church is built. They are at the origin of her faith and will forever remain her protectors and her guides. Under God's guidance they were led to make the Empire's capital of Rome the centre of the Christian world whence should radiate the

preaching of the Gospel. **Peter** laboured in Rome as an apostle.



He was the city's first bishop, and died there bound to a cross as a martyr under Nero, (67 A.D.). According to tradition he also was the first bishop of Antioch. He is the author of two letters, the first Christian encyclicals. St Paul arrived at Rome in the spring of 61 and passed the next two years in easy confinement before his release. The last years of his life were devoted to missionary excursions, probably including Spain, and to revisiting his first foundations. In 66 he returned to Rome, was taken prisoner, and beheaded a year later in the Via Ostia on the spot where now stands the basilica bearing his name. His fourteen letters are a precious legacy; they afford a deep insight into a great soul.

GOSPEL

Luke 9:51-62

As the time drew near for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely took the road for Jerusalem and sent messengers ahead of him. These set out, and they went into a Samaritan village to make preparations for him, but the people would not receive him because he was making for Jerusalem. Seeing this, the disciples James and John said, 'Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to burn them up?'

But he turned and rebuked them, and they went off to another village.

As they travelled along they met a man on the road who said to him, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' Jesus answered, 'Foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.'

Another to whom he said, 'Follow me', replied, 'Let me go and bury my father first.' But he answered, 'Leave the dead to bury their dead; your duty is to go and spread the news of the kingdom of God.'

Another said, 'I will follow you, sir, but first let me go and say goodbye to my people at home.' Jesus said to him, 'Once the hand is laid on the plough, no one who looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'

EXPLORING THE WORD

This gospel text marks a turning point in Luke's story of Jesus. He has made a momentous decision. When he is rejected by the very first village he approaches, the disciples want to punish them. But Jesus refuses violence and coercion as a means of conversion. He wants willing disciples!

The following three brief exchanges outline what is needed for disciple-ship: it won't necessarily be comfortable; there is a sense of urgency, and it requires single-mindedness and sometimes difficult choices. Comfort or family relationships cannot take priority over the kingdom of God, and once one becomes a follower of Christ, there can be no turning back.


This gospel is not only about Jesus; it is about all those who seek to follow the road God has laid out for them.

WHAT ARE YOU WAITING FOR?

Sometimes Jesus can seem a little uncaring in the clipped tone of gospel stories. A would-be-disciple asks to do the duty of a son to his father: to bury him. While it's not apparent in this translation, the father may not need burying right away. Chances are he's ill or old, however, the son is simply asking permission to delay his discipleship to a time when his father no longer needs him. It seems a reasonable request.

But Jesus knows how we use parents, children, spouses, work, or health to excuse ourselves from discipleship. All excuses meet the same response: God's kingdom won't wait. Present circumstances can never be obstacles to following Jesus. The life engaging us so deeply is the very place where our mission logically begins. We keep thinking vocations are for people who can clear away enough personal agenda to pursue one. Nice try. Our personal agenda is where vocation is happening.

Consider local ways to announce the kingdom to the poor, afflicted, oppressed. *GPBS eNews*
