- The evening on Friday began with a lovely **Vietnamese tea**, provided by the many volunteers from the centre.

- A **Welcome to Country** ceremony was then held.

- I sat with members from the Brighton and Aberfoyle Park parish groups, as well as members from SA Catholic teachers and they were all **excellent company**.

- We then had **videos of previous assemblies** including a quick vision of Fr. Vinh beaming and waving at the camera. We also saw **videos of groups now working for the church.**

These included the

All videos had a speaker telling of action in their groups. The evening finished with a talk from Archbishop Pat.


After a lovely lunch, the Regional Assemblies were discussed and the number of young people who participated.

SAINT THOMAS, Apostle Feast Day 3rd July (d. 72)



There is little about the apostle Thomas in the Gospels; St. Thomas, the disciple who at first did not believe, has become for the Church one of the first witnesses to

her faith. She is fond of appealing to his testimony and frequently puts in our mouths those simple words whereby he expressed the fervour of his regained faith: "My Lord and my God." Best-known is his expression of unbelief after the Saviour's death, giving rise to the phrase "doubting Thomas." It is known that St. Thomas preached the Gospel in Asia beyond the frontiers of the Roman Empire, probably in Persia and possibly as far afield as India. *Catholic Culture*


twelve years; after long and painful treatment under various doctors, she spent all she had without being any the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him through the crowd and touched his cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had told herself 'I shall be well again.' And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"" But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at his feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,' he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint.

While he was still speaking some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'Little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.

GOD TO US: MEET ME ANYWHERE

It's a familiar, charming story passed on from time to time: It is said that a little boy wanted to meet God, so he packed his backpack with goodies and set off on his journey. In short order, he found that it was time for a snack, so he sat down on the nearest park bench and opened his stash. He noticed an old woman at the other end of the bench who looked a little hungry, so he offered her half of his cupcake. She smiled and accepted it with pleasure. He then offered her some of his lemonade, which she accepted with another smile. They sat quietly thinking about things without saying a word. Finally as it got dark he got up to leave and waved a goodbye. Then he offered her a hug. Both the boy and the women went home happy – each quite sure they had met God in the park that day (though, the woman tells her daughter at home, "God's a lot younger than I expected.").

What to make of the mysterious phrase that Jesus "realised that power had gone out of him"? We all project attitudes and even powers, "vibes" that let others know they're welcome or not, that here is a listener, even a healer. What vibes do I give off? Signals that say, "Don't bother me"? Or are my Christian charity and compassion so evident that comfort and even healing might flow from me?
