#### STEWARDSHIP REFLECTIONS 6th January, 2019 Epiphany of Our Lord

"...the Gentiles are co-heirs, members of the same body, and co-partners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the Gospel (Ephesians3:6) Today we celebrate that Christ came to all of us, not just the Hebrews. He has given each of us unique gifts. We all have different yet equally valuable roles to play in the Body of Christ. Pray daily and ask God how He wants you to use your gifts so that we may all "be one".



#### POPE FRANCIS' NEW YEAR MESSAGE

"Peace be to this house!"
In sending his disciples forth
on mission, Jesus told them:
"Whatever house you enter,
first say, 'Peace be to this
house!' And if a son of



peace is there, your peace shall rest upon him; but if not, it shall return to you" (Lk 10:5-6). Bringing peace is central to the mission of Christ's disciples. That peace is offered to all those men and women who long for peace amid the tragedies and violence that mark human history. The "house" of which Jesus speaks is every family, community, country and continent, in all their diversity and history. It is first and foremost each individual person, without distinction or discrimination. But it is also our "common home": the world in which God has placed us and which we are called to care for and cultivate. So let this be my greeting at the beginning of the New Year: "Peace be to this house!" (from his longer New Year message: Good politics at the service of peace)

#### **FOLLOW YOUR STAR**

The wise men set out on a perilous journey to follow their star, a star they believed would take them to a new king. In those days a long journey by camel wasn't one to be taken lightly. At times they lost sight of the star but finally found their way to a child in a manger - the least likely place for a king to be found. We set out on a journey at Baptism, to follow our star, Jesus. It has not always been easy and there have been times when we have lost sight of who and where He was. We find Him again and again perhaps in moments of joy, perhaps in times of sorrow, perhaps through trials, through the love of a spouse or kindness of a friend, through steady perseverance in trying to do what is right, perhaps in the face of someone who needed us. Where will we find Him this year? Let us ask for the grace to know Him once more.

#### ST RAYMOND OF PENYAFORT Feast Day 7<sup>th</sup> January (1175 – 1275)



Since Raymond lived into his hundredth year, he had a chance to do many things. As a member of the Spanish nobility he received a good education.

By the time he was 20, he was teaching philosophy. In his early 30s he

earned a doctorate in both canon and civil law. At 41 he became a Dominican. Pope Gregory IX called him to Rome and asked him to gather together all the decrees of popes and councils that had been made in 80 years. Raymond compiled five books called the Decretals. They were looked upon as one of the best organized collections of Church law until the 1917 codification of canon law. When he was 63 he was elected by his fellow Dominicans to be the head of the whole Order, the successor of Saint Dominic. He still had 35 years to oppose heresy and work for the conversion of the Moors in Spain. The Lord called him to retire in his 100<sup>th</sup> year.

## POPE FRANCIS' NEW YEAR MESSAGE IS "GOOD POLITICS AT THE SERVICE OF PEACE"

His annual blessing of peace to the whole



world focuses on the importance of political life in the creation of a human community in which the rights of all are respected. He sees politics as essen-

tial to the human vocation to help build the "universal city of God" in which God's desires for the well-being of the human family come to fruition.

Yet, as we are all too well aware, the abuse of politics for personal gain is all too rife, resulting in the "oppression, marginalization and even destruction" of many people. Some of the signs of this are corruption, xenophobia, racism, disregard for the environment, the plundering of natural resources and contempt for refugees.

To counter these vices of politics we need to practice a "politics of peace", in which respect for all, especially the most vulnerable and the young, build a world of trust and confidence.

As we celebrate the 70th anniversary of the declaration of Universal Human Rights, and the 100th anniversary of the end of World War 1, let us commit ourselves to the three-fold conversion to which the Gospel calls us—peace with oneself, peace with each other, and peace with creation.

And as we begin this year with a Federal election looming, and with the poisoning of political life all too evident both here and elsewhere, I look forward to the chance to have conversations in our Catholic communities about how we can help to create "good politics at the service of peace." 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him, 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

#### **NOTES OF TODAY'S GOSPEL**

The visit of the Magi occurs directly before the story of the Holy Family's flight into Egypt. Matthew's Gospel tells a version of Jesus' birth that is different than the one in Luke. Of the actual birth of Jesus, Matthew tells us little more than, "When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod . . ." The story of the census is found only in Luke's Gospel, but we hear about the visit of the Magi only in Matthew's Gospel.


We know little about the Magi. They come from the East and journey to Bethlehem, following an astrological

sign, so we believe them to be astrologers. We assume that there were three Magi based upon the naming of their three gifts. The Gospel does not say how many Magi paid homage to Jesus. In Matthew's Gospel, they represent the Gentiles' search for a saviour. Because the Magi represent the entire world, they also represent our search for Jesus.

We have come to consider the gifts they bring as a foreshadowing of Jesus' role in salvation. We believe the meaning of the gifts to be Christological. Gold is presented as representative of Jesus' kingship. Frankincense is a symbol of his divinity because priests burned the substance in the Temple. Myrrh, which was used to prepare the dead for burial, is offered in anticipation of Jesus' death.

The word Epiphany means "manifestation" or "showing forth." Historically several moments in Christ's early life and ministry have been celebrated as "epiphanies," including his birth in Bethlehem, the visit of the Magi, his baptism by John, and his first miracle at Cana.
